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2024 AIMS@JCU PhD Scholarship Recipient



Sarah Ghobish



Sarah Ghobish hails from Egypt. She studied pharmacy at the Misr International University in Egypt, and, after graduating in 2018, worked as a teaching assistant in the chemistry department. She received her Master's degree in chemistry in June 2023 which opened her eyes to the possibility of applying her passion for chemistry to support the long-term health of the marine environment.

Sarah jumped at the opportunity to pursue a PhD at JCU where she will be working under the supervision of Dr George Vamvounis (JCU) and Dr Cherie Motti (AIMS) to synthesize new safe and sustainable polymers and plasticisers to lessen future environmental impact.

Marine plastic pollution is a major global problem that needs to be addressed. In addition to reducing the number of plastics that enter our oceans, we need to urgently develop new plastics that have minimal impact on marine life. Commercial plastics contain plasticisers that impart flexibility specific to the plastic's application. Unfortunately, many of these plasticisers are toxic and, when immersed in water, can leach from the polymeric matrix and continue to do so as plastics fragment into smaller microplastics. Critically, the development of new sustainable and/or biodegradable plasticisers with lower leaching potential is needed to mitigate the entry of these hazardous chemicals into the marine environment.

Sarah is grateful for the opportunity to learn at JCU and work with AIMS on such an impactful project as well as thankful to have been awarded an AIMS@JCU scholarship that will support the funding of such a project and motivate her research.


Science Communication Award Report

What a fabulous year 2024 has been for our AIMS@JCU family. We have achieved so much: with a total of \$13,250 being awarded in competitive student grants; four AMSA student memberships sponsored; important networking and educational events organised, such as the seminar day, R-Course, morning teas and our writing retreat; we are in the process of recruiting three more postdoctoral fellows, as well as four more PhD scholarship students; we have supported ATSIMS, the JCU Winter School, two 12-week Indigenous Internships and have put into place a new indigenous undergraduate scholarship; five of our student members have completed their degrees; and we've welcomed new members (19 staff and 38 students).
